

We want to make sure that all of our volunteers enjoy their volunteering experience with us and that they have a chance to use their strengths and experience to enhance our work supporting carers and disabled people. Many of our volunteers are carers or have been carers themselves.

Peer Mentor

Peer mentors have a valuable role in working with young carers to support them to be able to fully participate and engage in social and community life, for many young carers this can be challenging to achieve due to a variety of factors.

Peer mentoring asks for a commitment of 1 year to ensure a positive relationship is built. The nature of this role is 1-2-1 support to achieve pre-determined goals that the young person has. This will be done through planned fun and worthwhile activities that have been agreed upon by the young person, their family, the peer support line manager and you, our peer mentor.



Adult Achievement Awards

Volunteers aged 16+ have an opportunity to take part in the Adult Achievement Awards. This is a nationally recognized qualification awarded through Napier University.

Saltire Awards

Aged 12 - 25? Get recognized for your volunteering. We have a wide range of volunteering opportunities for young people so there's sure to be something you can get involved with.

Community Fundraiser

Fundraising is fun, rewarding and a great opportunity to meet new people. Moreover, community fund raisers have a valuable role in helping to raise money and to represent and promote the Centre's work within the community.

As Fundraiser you will work co-productively with the Community Fundraising Group to organize events and generate funds for the Centre.



Volunteering Roles

Bi-Lingual Support

Bilingual volunteers work alongside the Minority Ethnic Outreach Workers in a range of different areas. This can include helping out with regular groups, one-off events or providing some form of support to Minority Ethnic carers. The main purpose of the role is to provide assistance to the Minority Ethnic workers with translation where necessary. The support groups provided by the Centre afford an invaluable opportunity for carers to experience a supportive and understanding environment, and reduce the sense of isolation that many of them often feel.

Centre Ambassador

Centre Ambassadors are the face of our organisation at community events, community centres and awareness raising events. They also work with our Communications Team to check that our information is out there and is up to date in various locations.



Adult Group Helper

We provide a range of groups for carers and we need people to help us run these groups. Duties include setting up at the start and tidying up after as well as being a welcoming face for new people and watching out for others who are quiet to help them engage.

Respite Volunteer

Short Breaks volunteers have a valuable role in helping to promote the work of the service and raise awareness of carers' issues at a local level. Volunteers will be supported and encouraged to develop links and opportunities within local areas in conjunction with the Short Breaks team



Young Carers Group Support

The support our Young Carers groups provide are an invaluable opportunity for carers ages 8-16, to experience a supportive and understanding environment, and to reduce the sense of isolation that can often be experienced as a result of the caring role. We run a variety of group activities for different ages including regular sessions and one-off holiday activities.

Volunteer Drivers

Drivers can help with a variety of different activities as and when required. This could include responsibilities such as transporting young people to and from weekly support groups, driving a group of young carers on a holiday, programme activity or transporting a group of adult carers on a walking trip.

You must let your insurer know if you use your own car in your volunteering role.

If you are looking to help us driving a mini bus you need to have the D1 entitlement on your driving license, and would be required to undertake Dundee City Council's minibus test if you have not already done so. A staff member will also be present on the bus to assist with the supervisory role regardless of the trip.
